CUTTING ROOM

VINYL BUFFS

We are presently trying a different type of vinyl on both the hard and the soft vinyl polish buffs. It is a light duty flooring vinyl that we are buying from Bunnings. The previous type was a softer upholstery vinyl. The black and white squares pattern does however give some unusual visual effects as the buff rotates. It appears as if this may be better type for our application <u>but we need</u> your feedback and comments

Even though it is a stronger vinyl it can still be damaged or worn out quickly with misuse. The main problem occurs when polishing back bevels, the thin edge of the bevel can cut deeply into the buff. It is good practice to always use the outer part of the buff for back bevels and leave the central portion to polish the back of the Cab.

If the vinyl is badly damaged then it should be replaced. Take care when removing the old disc from the soft buff as the backing rubber can be damaged. Spare discs are kept on the top shelf of the cupboard where we keep the loose grit. Spread a thin coat of disc cement on the disc, let it dry for a few minutes and then stick it on.

SAFETY GOGGLES

The Club supplies safety goggles for Member's use when using the grinders and trim saws. There are also goggles for sale in the Club shop for those Members who prefer to have their own.

GOOD FAIRIES

Did you know that our Club has a number of fairies, elves and gnomes who are very active around the Clubrooms? They are seldom seen, but the work they put in is very obvious, our rooms get cleaned, garbage bins get emptied, chairs are set up for meetings, clean tea towels are always there and lots and lots more. However they always need more helpers so here is some information for you so you can help out.

The pantry cupboard in the kitchen between the fridge and the stove is normally well stocked with paper towels, matches, garbage bags and coffee cups etc. Food stocks are kept in the right hand pantry cupboard, tea towels and tablecloths are to the right under the servery and cleaning items are under the sink or in the broom cupboard. If something is needed then just get it out. If something needs cleaning or washing then do it. If garbage bin is full then take the bag up to the Council bin at the top of the pathway.

For the Cab cutters there is an important cupboard in the entrance lobby, it's the second one to the right from the door. The top shelf has the sanding discs, spare vinyl discs and usually a spare canvas buff. Polish powder and oil for the trim saws is kept on the centre shelf with silicon carbide grit and a tin of disc cement on the bottom shelf.

If a sanding disc or vinyl needs replacing then check with your instructor and replace it. Spread a thin coat of disc cement to the back of the disc and then stick the disc on. Sometimes there is enough cement left from the old disc new cement is not needed. Vinyl discs are put on the same way.

Polish bottles need a good scoop of polish powder and then filling with water.

The three trim saws use a soluble oil water based coolant. This is mixed with one part of oil to twenty parts of water. The three big saws near the Bopping bench use a very different oil and the two types must never be mixed.

Metho is kept in a bottle on or over the sink, spare metho is in the sink cupboard.

Of course, when you finish a class then all machines and dopping bench are always cleaned down and if necessary the cutting room garbage bin is emptied.

So here is your chance, you too can be a good fairy or if you prefer an elf or a gnome.

TOOLS IN THE JEWELLERY CUPBOARD



Sanding and polishing 'bits' for use in the dental tools.

Did you know that in the cupboard nearest the entrance are several dental drills. A similar tool is

to be found in an attaché case in the bottom of the jewellery cupboard.

The drawers pictured above hold a vast number of little brushes, burrs and impregnated rubber bits for finishing your jewellery to a 'professional' standard.



When we have finished soldering and cleaning our article the little rubber bits which have been impregnated with varying grades of grit are the way to go. The six bits in the plastic bag go from the course black through green, blue, mauve, apricot to the pink one which polishes. There are four different shapes in brown and green rubber bits with the brown being the courser. Then of course there are the many felts and brushes which can be used with tripoli to pre-polish and remove any small imperfections. The fluffy little mops can be used to impart a finishing shine when used with rouge. The little brushes are best used for items with a textured finish. The felts are good for smooth finishes and edges. Don't forget the edges.

The most important thing to remember when finishing off a piece, whether you are sanding, smoothing or polishing is that you must not lose the profile of your metal. Choose the bit you intend to use with care. It should be the same profile (in reverse) as the piece you are working on. There are some little cratex discs with a nice fine edge for cleaning around a bezel but take care not to lose the smooth flatness of the area surrounding it.

With the aid of these items and the large dental polisher with its felt and cloth wheels, and using tripoli and rouge you should be able to achieve a finish that will make you proud to wear.

Tailgaters must take out their own policy and forward a copy of same of same to Gem & Lapidary Council before the event. Further the gem Council advises that the policy must include the actual name of the person who is insured. Additionally Clubs should remember the moment they sell trading space to any person, that person is not covered by the Club's Public Risk Policy.

Box Chain Illustration



A box chain is made up of square links that are connected to create a smooth chain.

Wheat Chain Illustration



To make a wheat chain, oval and twisted oval links are connected and intertwined together. The result is an intricate chain with a great deal of visual texture

Rolo Chain Illustration



A rolo chain is made up of symmetrical links that are joined together.

Most chain jewelry is made from one kind of chain, but you'll see many pieces that are assembled with multiple chain types. Combining chains gives designers one more tool they can use to tap into their creativity.
